Our speakers included Ms. Susan Guner, a holistic psychotherapist and host of the Psychedelics Conversations podcast, who shared insights into how psychedelics are helping those suffering from illness, Professor Emma Robinson, Professor of Psychopharmacology who explored her research on affective biases and emotional behaviour in rodents using psychedelic drugs, and Dr Danielle Kurtin a research fellow at Imperial College London who investigates the neural underpinnings of substance (mis)use/dependence.


## **PAST SOCIALS**

Neave designed a graphic and social media post discussing sex differences in the context of pain, aiming to raise awareness and foster understanding.














## PRESENT YOUR LAB TECHNIQUE (PYLT):

WiNUK also posted Part 2 of Caitlin Cosgrove's PYLT (Present Your Lab Technique). This post delved into the technical aspects of extracellular vesicle (EV) research, providing an insightful look at:

- EV isolation using Size Exclusion Chromatography (SEC)
- EV characterization through Nanoparticle Tracking Analysis (NTA), determining particle size and concentration
- EV modification via Electroporation for therapeutic cargo loading
- The application of these modified EVs in a cell model of ischaemic stroke, highlighting their potential in medical research and therapeutic development.


